National UCW AGM September 19-23, 2022
Queen of Apostles Retreat Centre, Mississauga, ON
STANDING WITH GOD IN HOPE

A full agenda, honoured guests, enrichment presenters, and decisions to be made to guide us into the next five years made this meeting a memorable one.

Of major importance was that this September 2022 Annual Meeting of the National UCW Executive was our first in-person business meeting since 2019. What a rich experience to meet in person! National meetings on-line via Zoom

have proven to be efficient to get the business done, but, as many of you have discovered in your own regions, we lost something in the translation. We have been missing the human touch and the opportunities for face-to-face communication and debate, and human contact. Hugs, even if shared by mask-wearing participants, are elemental and there is no substitute.

WORSHIP:

We are blessed each year to share worship daily as part of our meeting program. The highlight is our closing worship and communion service, held on the final day. This year we were able to extend our service out to women from across Canada who could join us via Zoom. Rev. Dr. Japhet Ndlhovu, our Executive Minister for Church in Mission, led us in worship.

THE WEEK IN REVIEW:

Hanging over us for much of the week was the approach of Hurricane Fiona which was scheduled to hit parts of Quebec and most of Maritime Canada by week's end. We worried with the women who would be returning to their communities, uncertain whether their families, friends and properties would suffer. Could they make the journey home from Ontario without delays or diversions? We prayed with them together as we monitored Fiona's status.

Honoured guests to guide us: Our very honoured guest for this meeting was Right Reverend Dr. Carmen Lansdowne, Kwisa'lakw, newly elected Moderator of the United Church of Canada.

Rev. Lansdowne shared how she personally faced the big question of how to be both Indigenous and a Christian within a colonizing church during her journey into her present role. Her work with the World Council of Churches and most recently as Executive Director of First United Church Community Ministry Society, active in Vancouver's Downtown East side is only part of her story.

Rev. Lansdowne reminded us that Christianity is an Easter religion that believes in Resurrection and Transformation, but that the Christian story is not the Church. Her mother told her that, "Unless we're doing mission with integrity with the most disadvantaged...we're not doing mission with integrity anywhere." Canadian society is set up to preserve the status quo, and that is what we are up against. System injustice should trigger us to hope, not that hope itself is the solution, but that hope is the spark for creating a new vision.



In her sharing with us, Rev. Landsdowne commended the UCW for the good job we have already done as an organization but she set us a challenge to seek a new vision of how to be a church as UCW in this 21st century.

- Build and rebuild our connections
- Work toward social change that will create a well-cared-for world that preserves human dignity
- Walk together in repentance and reconciliation
- March and fight to change unjust systems
- Sing and pray and discern together to raise a new generation of leaders

We were also blessed to welcome Rev. Michael Blair, General Secretary for United Church of Canada and a dear friend of United Church Women. Rev. Blair has many times over reminded us that, “God is not finished with us yet!”

Bible Study: Rev. Amy Crawford, Team Lead Identity in Mission led our Bible Study. Amy presented the story of Ruth and Naomi, two women of different faiths, relateable women, in a story of Love and Faith in action from the Book of Ruth.

Enrichment Presentation: Women Hymnologists: Rev. Dr. Michael Brooks, Lead Minister, Port Nelson United Church. Filling the hour with music and story, Rev. Brooks led us through a series of hymns all written by women. He spoke to the opinion that our theology could be thought of as being shaped by our hymns not a prayer book.

UCW FIVE YEAR SPECIAL PROJECT SELECTION: This year’s NUCW Executive were challenged to select the next Five-Year Special Project from a list of four possible options. This next Special Project follows on the success of our 55th Anniversary partnership choice -- *Women for Change – Zambia*. **THE HEALING FUND - Women and Children, was selected** for partnership with United Church Women as our next Five-year Special Project 2022 – 2027, to conclude at the 65th UCW Anniversary celebration.

- **Executive Minister Murray Pruden, Indigenous Ministries** on behalf of The Healing Fund; **Joni Shawana, Healing Fund Program Coordinator** will be our key contacts for this project.

LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT STATEMENTS: It is our practice to make a formal land acknowledgement as a sign of respect toward truth and reconciliation with indigenous peoples of Canada. Land acknowledgement statements are now spoken at the beginning of a gathering and some are incorporated into written correspondence. Some of our members were curious about the process of writing a statement appropriate for each of their own areas. Much information is easily available on-line now, and you are urged to do your own research. Nova Scotia: In 1993, Nova Scotia Premier John Savage and Mi'kmaw Grand Chief Ben Sylliboy declared October as the official month to recognize and celebrate Mi'kmaw culture and heritage.

Women from across Canada and Bermuda experienced first hand the beauty and richness of the Mi'kmaq culture when we visited Nova Scotia this July at our 60th Anniversary celebration. Our hosts at **Membertou First Nation**, a community located on Unama'ki - Cape Breton Island, provided many moments for enrichment and learning during our stay.

Chief Terrance Paul welcomed us warmly in his opening address and spoke of the spirit of Membertou and its close-knit and vibrant people. The deeply moving blessing ceremony that opened our first night of celebration inspired us to learn more about our hosts and the rich history of the area. Located at the meeting site, Membertou Heritage Park offered a living history of the people and the Mi'kmaq culture, with many beautiful cultural touches present throughout the venue.

CELEBRATES HER 30TH ANNIVERSARY
